◆ HISTORY

Fred and Marian Pfister Anschutz created the Anschutz Family Foundation in 1982 as a result of many years of successful gas and oil, real estate and ranching ventures.

Fred B. Anschutz's (1909-1993) career was characterized by uncanny and intuitive foresight and by a willingness to enter into ventures others considered too risky. His first business success came through striking a rich oil field in his home state of Kansas. Earnings from an oil exploration business that eventually spanned Kansas, Colorado, Utah, and Wyoming were parlayed into ranches and livestock operations across the West. The family and their business headquarters moved from Wichita to Denver in the 1960's. Marian P. Anschutz (1910-1986) with husband, Fred, ingrained traditional American values of hard work, community involvement and love of the land in their children and grandchildren.

Sue Anschutz-Rodgers has continued her parents' legacy through her own business and ranching ventures and commitment to philanthropy. The Foundation's assets have grown over its 41-year history from the original \$4.5 million endowment to \$56 million through investments and additional family contributions. Sue served as the Foundation's first President and Executive Director and currently serves as its Chair and President. Four of the founders' six grandchildren and six great-grandchildren currently serve as trustees of the Foundation, while granddaughter Susan Rodgers Drumm served as program officer from 1994-2001.

Since its inception, the Foundation has distributed more than 11,000 grants to nonprofit organizations totaling nearly \$66 million. The Foundation's focus on supporting organizations that meet human and community needs in Colorado has remained steady throughout its existence. In the early years, the Foundation funded fewer organizations with larger grants. Gradually, the philosophy shifted to providing smaller grants (\$5,000-\$10,000) to many organizations. The intent was to spread the Foundation's resources into more areas and to encourage nonprofits to develop diversified funding streams. Although the primary activity of the Foundation is grantmaking, considerable energy has been and will continue to be directed toward efforts to build the capacity of Colorado's nonprofit sector, to enhance grant making overall, and to work collaboratively with other funders.

In the early 1990's, the Foundation initiated Colorado Rural Philanthropy Days (RPD), a twice-yearly event that built on an initiative of the nonprofit community in Grand Junction. Sue's vision in launching Colorado Rural Philanthropy Days was to increase foundation support to rural areas of the state. The intent is for private and public funders, who are concentrated along the Front Range, to visit Colorado's rural communities to gain a greater understanding of the issues and challenges faced in those communities and to facilitate introductions between metro-based funders and Colorado's rural nonprofit leaders and local elected officials. RPD addresses two of the Foundation's goals: to increase funding to nonprofit organizations in rural Colorado and to demystify the grant-making process.

The Foundation plans to continue on its current path of embracing opportunities that enhance the nonprofit sector and focusing on organizations that strengthen families and communities and assist people to help themselves.

◆ INFORMATION FOR GRANT SEEKERS

MISSION AND VALUES

The Anschutz Family Foundation supports rural and urban Colorado nonprofit organizations that assist people to help themselves while nurturing and preserving their self-respect. The Foundation encourages endeavors that strengthen families and communities and advance individuals to become productive and responsible citizens. There is a special interest in self-sufficiency, community development, and programs aimed at the economically disadvantaged, the young, the elderly, and people with disabilities.

AREAS OF INTEREST

The Foundation's mission is purposely broad, allowing it to support the work of many nonprofits that focus on improving the quality of life for individuals and communities. The bulk of the Foundation's grants are made in categories most directly related to the stated goals of the Foundation: *improving the lives of individuals, promoting self-sufficiency, and community development*. Grants generally support programs or services that fit within one or more of the Foundation's funding areas including:

- Civic, Community, and Capacity Building
- Crisis Intervention
- Early Childhood Development
- Food/Shelter/Homeless
- Humane Animal Services
- Low-Income Housing
- People with Disabilities
- Self-Sufficiency/Families/Literacy
- Senior Programs
- Youth Development/Outdoor Programs

ELIGIBILITY AND GEOGRAPHIC FOCUS

The Foundation aims for an even distribution of grants between organizations serving in

Colorado's rural and urban communities. To be considered for funding from the Foundation, an organization must have activities or programs that take place in the state of Colorado and the organization must be classified as one of the following:

- A 501(c)(3) tax-exempt public charity
- A sponsored project of a 501(c)(3) nonprofit acting as a fiscal sponsor
- A government or tax-supported public entity

TYPES OF GRANTS

Recognizing that organizational infrastructure is a necessity, the Foundation welcomes requests for general operating support. The Foundation also accepts requests for specific programs, and occasionally issues a challenge grant when the Foundation sees both a need and an opportunity for the organization to expand its funding base.

GRANT SIZE

Typical grants range between \$5,000 to \$10,000, but generally do not exceed 10% of an organization's annual budget.

WHAT WE DO NOT FUND

Generally, the Foundation does not support:

- Arts and culture
- Capital campaigns (On rare occasions, the Foundation will fund capital campaigns for organizations located in rural Colorado whose mission closely aligns with the Foundation's interests. Applicants are advised to submit a one-page Letter of Inquiry prior to the submission of a grant request for this purpose.)
- Education (primary or secondary)
- Endowments, debt reduction, or loans
- Grants to individuals
- Healthcare, mental health, or disease-specific
- Multi-year grants
- Organizations with annual budgets in excess of \$10 million
- Organizations in leadership transition (i.e. interim director)
- Organizations that discriminate in any way
- Political causes, candidates, or campaigns
- Public policy, advocacy, or research
- Start-up organizations
- Programs outside of Colorado
- Religious organizations for religious purposes
- Special events, conferences, or promotions
- Type III Supporting Organizations under IRS Section 509(a)(3)

◆ LETTER OF INQUIRY

The Foundation invites organizations to submit a brief one- to two-page Letter of Inquiry (LOI) prior to completing a full grant application that specifies how the organization's work aligns with the Foundation's funding priorities. While not required, LOIs are encouraged from:

- First-time applicants
- Organizations which have been turned down in the past
- Organizations uncertain of fit and alignment with the Foundation's focus and interest areas

LOIs can be submitted at any time through the grantee portal. More information on what to include and details for electronically submitting an LOI can be found on the Foundation's website at www.anschutzfamilyfoundation.org.

A Foundation staff member will contact the organization, typically within three to four weeks after submittal. If the organization appears to be a good fit, the Foundation will invite the organization to submit a full grant application in its next grant cycle. Inquiries submitted within three weeks of a grant application deadline (January 15 or July 1) may not be reviewed until the following grant cycle.

◆ GUIDELINES FOR SUBMITTING A PROPOSAL

PROPOSAL DEADLINES

The Foundation's grant deadlines are January 15 and July 1. A complete application must be submitted online (preferred) or received in our office by 5 p.m. on the deadline date. The online application form is accessible approximately one to two months prior to the application deadline. Only one application per organization is accepted per calendar year.

TWO-YEAR RULE

Organizations receiving funding from the Foundation for two consecutive years must take one year off before reapplying.

PROPOSAL SUBMISSION

Please visit the Foundation's website at www.anschutzfamilyfoundation.org to preview our application and submit your proposal.

Although online submissions are preferred, printed applications are accepted and must be received in our office by 5 p.m. on the deadline. Faxed or emailed applications are not accepted.

You will receive an immediate email confirmation upon successfully submitting your online application.

PROPOSAL REVIEW SCHEDULE

Proposals received by the January 15 deadline will be decided upon at the mid-May Foundation board of trustees meeting. Proposals received by the July 1 deadline will be decided upon at the late-November Foundation board of trustees meeting.

WHAT WE LOOK FOR WHEN REVIEWING PROPOSALS

- Alignment with the Foundation's mission and interests
- Clearly presented goals, objectives, and strategies
- A provision of unduplicated, needed programs and services
- Sustainable and diversified funding streams
- Solid financial statements and cash reserves
- Demonstrated financial need
- Proven track record of success with positive outputs and outcomes
- Effective and qualified leadership
- Engaged and committed board of directors with 100% making a meaningful financial contribution to the organization
- Strong, effective, and ongoing organization and program evaluation

- Community buy-in and support evidenced through donations, volunteer engagement, collaborations, and partnerships
- Utilization of best practices and principles across all levels of the organization

◆ GRANT REPORTING

The Foundation requires a final report on how the grant was used within one year after receiving the grant award (typically by June 1 or December 1) or at the time a new grant request is submitted, whichever comes first. A final report is required before your organization can be considered for subsequent grants.

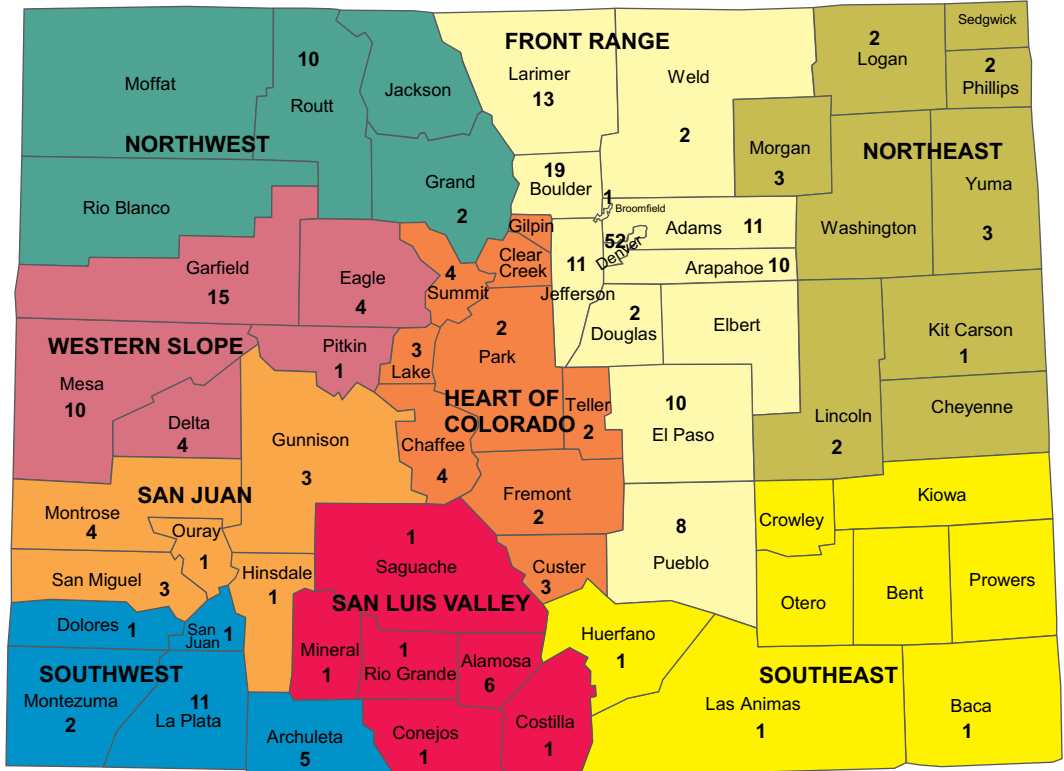
